Initial Applications are accepted through Oct 31 of the senior year in high school.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

1. Seniors in high schools throughout the United States who meet the eligibility requirements may apply each year for one of 250 four-year, achievement-based scholarships.

2. Approximately 2,200 applicants will be selected as Semifinalists and notified by mail and email around December 1. Semifinalists must then complete a secondary application, including essays, official transcripts, and two letters of recommendation. Semifinalist applications are due by mid-January. Our Program Review Committee will select 250 Finalists to advance to the final interview phase. Notifications are sent mid-February.

3. In April, the 250 Finalists are invited to Atlanta for personal interviews. The Finalists are interviewed by a National Selection Committee representing outstanding leaders in business, government, education and the arts. 50 students are then designated as National Scholars and receive awards of \$20,000 for college; 200 students are designated as Regional Scholars and receive awards of \$10,000 for college.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

APPLICANTS MUST BE:

 CURRENT high school (or home-schooled) seniors attending school in the United States (or select DoD schools);

★ Helping Students Write The Winning Essay

I. Brainstorm

- Listing important events.
- Events should impact the student. These may be positive or negative
- Have student create a list of life or work experiences and that have molded their interests.

I. Brainstorm

- Questions to ask students
 - What makes you unique?
 - How much education are you interested in?
 - Have you had to overcome any unusual or hardships (for example economic, family, or physical) in your life?

2. Narrow Down The Topic

- Have student choose one event from the list that stands out as being very important. Have them write a few sentences about the event.
- Have student choose one or two work experiences that had the most impact on them and write a few sentences about event.
- Write a few sentences about their best achievement/talent/or how they overcame a difficult situation.

3. Organizing The Essay

- A. An introductory paragraph with a thesis or theme
 - The opening sentence and paragraph must match the interest of the reader by painting a real life scene. The beginning of the essay must be unique and must stand out above the others.
- B. Two to three ideas with sub points that support the theme/thesis
- C. A conclusion

 Write an essay (500 Word Maximum) describing your background and goals.
 Explain why you feel you should be granted a scholarship.

Activity #I

- As sweat poured down my forehead and I fought off the swarms of mosquitoes and my hands hurt from blisters, I picked tomatoes from the half mile row of fields. Life as a migrant farm worker is hard. It is hard to work twelve-hour shifts everyday alongside my family each year during the crop season.

Working in a nursing home once a month as a volunteer gives me an appreciation for the needs of the elderly.
- Having excelled in science and math I wish to study in the medical field and become a pharmacist. I love the thought of helping people and just as a doctor helps their patients, a pharmacist does the same by filling prescriptions.
- I know I have the potential, knowledge, and strength to become successful even though my circumstances have been incredibly difficult. I have learned the lessons that have taught me about life. Unfortunately, without a scholarship I will be unable to attend college because my family is not financially able to help me. It will mean giving up my dreams, which I refuse to do.

Activity #2

Hello my name is Ali Cruz and I was born in California. I am interested in the scholarship because, I need money for college. I have been involved in high school activities. My favorite is that I am involved in basketball. One of the reasons why I enjoy basketball so much is because it keeps me motivated to continue going to school so I can continue to play basketball. When I play basketball, I feel that I can accomplish many things.

- I have also helped in the community by completing 40 hours of community service. My high school required us to and I helped at the local homeless shelter. At the shelter I made sure that the people were treated with respect and I enjoyed listening to their stories. Doing this, it made me realize that you need to treat people with respect regardless of where they come from and the experiences that they have had.
- From this experience I learned that many things can happen in life and only with an education can you be more prepared to face the different circumstances that life brings. Helping at the shelter allowed me to gain an understanding of the impact of making life choices. The people at the shelter taught me a lot.
- I know with this scholarship, I can continue with my studies. Any contribution will greatly help in reaching my goals of playing basketball and getting an education.

- 3. Essay has three parts
 - . Self- specific accounts, details; show confidence
 - 2. Academic plans
 - 3. Professional plans
- 4. Dissect the essay
- 5. Proofread
- 6. Give advise and input and revise, revise, revise
